








The continuing success of the Charity is based on a team of dedicated and enthusiastic volunteer drivers supported and organised by a small part time staff equally committed to the aims of the scheme.

The demand for our service continues to grow at some ten percent year on year. Although the majority of the appointments for the children we serve are within the Greater Manchester Area we have answered requests for transport to specialist units in Bradford, Leeds, Sheffield, Birmingham and Liverpool.

The value of the contribution made to the local community by the Charity has been recognised during the year. The volunteer drivers won the Manchester City Council "Contribution to the Community" Group award for 2007. Stockport MBC and Rochdale MBC awarded certificates of appreciation to all the drivers in their communities. Barbara Donoghue was chosen as the "Outstanding Volunteer Of The Year" by Rochdale MBC. Sarah Drake was awarded "Order of Mercy" by The League of Mercy: just reward for someone who served the Charity in many capacities and for many years. Congratulations and well done to them all.

The front cover to this report was drawn by Orianne from Abingdon Primary School and was the winning entry in a school competition arranged by Transport Organiser Clare Bickley. Thank you Clare for your initiative.





Income




Income by NHS Primary Care Trust



Why we do what we do

A Case Study:

We have helped a Mohammed Dildar since August 2006 and to the year ending 31st March 2008 we completed 54 trips.

Transport For Sick Childrens driver Tom Bevan has completed almost all of these trips. The child was born prematurely and the parents really struggled to visit their baby. The family live in Bolton so the daily trip to Royal Manchester Children's Hospital was a huge hurdle for the family to overcome. With the help of Transport For Sick Children the parents were able to see their baby regularly and so aid the baby's recovery.

After almost 2 years of help and support the baby was finally discharged.

Tom Bevan has built up a relationship with the family and has enjoyed seeing the baby improve and eventually go home.

"The parents were always really appreciative and sometimes took photo's of the driver and his family to show other members of their family how much help we gave them. I found Mrs Dildar easy to assist even when things went wrong. The baby even smiles sometimes when I've strapped him into the baby chair. It's been a long road and lots of trips. It is nice to see the culmination of all the help and support I've given and the end result is so positive now the baby is back home with his family."

"Mohammed is now two and a half years old. He was born with a very complex medical condition and has spent most of his life in hospital either at RMCH or his local hospital. When the child was in RMCH his parents had great difficulty visiting him, as they do not have any transport. TFSC were able to bring parents and his 3-year-old sister to visit him twice a week for well over a year.

By February 2008 the child's medical condition had stabilised and discharge home looked feasible. With the invaluable help of TFSC the child started to go home for short periods once a week, initially for two to three hours. The driver was able to pick the mother up from home, come to RMCH with her then take the child home and bring

them back later. By April 08, He was having overnight stays, first one night then two and finally on the 15th May 08 he was discharged home and continues to be at home. His care is very demanding. He requires 3 gastrostomy tube feeds during the day and continuous overnight feeds for 12 hours but the child and his family are clearly doing very well at home. He continues to have frequent clinic appointments which TFSC help with. Without the help and support of TFSC such a smooth transition to home would not have been possible."

Treasurer's Report



It is pleasing to report that after another record year of activity the charity's finances are sound. This has been brought about because of:

- Urban 'Bus grant final year payments
- Increased income from the Primary Care Trusts
- Increase in level of donations
- Sound control of expenditure.

The Urban Bus Grant, which was received for a three year period, has been worth about £30,000 per year for three years, ended in February 2008. The Grant was part of a submission made in 2004 by Greater Manchester Passenger Transport Executive. The Transport Executive has supported the charity for some years and wished to sustain the desire to increase the activity to match the believed demand. The Grant has had a major impact on the growth achieved in the last three years and given time to allow the needed increase in income from other sources, to be able to finance the increased growth when the Urban 'Bus Grant ceased. It should be noted that, before the award of the Grant, GMPTE was already financially supporting the charity and its contribution was important in its survival. In the last year GMPTE have reduced their support, but this should be seen as a compliment that funding is now less of an issue. Nevertheless our indebtedness to GMPTE for their support deserves to be recognised.

The total income from Primary Care Trusts was £77,047. This is an increase of £16,587 against the previous year. There has been a positive approach from the Trusts in discussions with them and the plan is to have contracts with all of them. This process has already started. The increase in funding is obviously important, but with it has come a substantial improvement in the timing of the payments, which has assisted the cash flow immensely.

Donations have reached a record level. A volunteer gave £5,000; MastLift Manchester £3,900 from a golf day held on our behalf; Moto in the Community gave £1,000; Heywood Charities Fete, donating for the seventh year running, gave £500, The Friendship Mark Of Master Masons £250. There were many smaller donations too numerous to mention here but important to the charity. Over the year our Volunteer Drivers, without whom we would not exist, donated over £1,000. Our thanks are due to all of our donors for their very generous support.

Interest earned in the year was approximately £5,500.

During the year the computer based management system has been upgraded, new hardware purchased and an improved telephone system installed. These changes have assisted in the running cost of the service being carefully controlled.


There are signs of a change in some of the children served. There are journeys being carried out that are in the responsibility of the local authority rather than the Primary Care Trusts. If this continues to grow funding must be sought from local authorities for the service provided.

The charity has always been financially well managed. One of the guide lines that has been used and continues to be observed, is that there must be a minimum of six months reserves available at any time to maintain the service. If it reduces below this level action must be taken to ensure the charity's continued existence. At the time of writing this report the reserves are in excess of one year giving sufficient time for increasing funding to meet the expected rise in children served over the foreseeable future.
